TWO PIES LIGHTER

Early on Thanksgiving morning, I drove down an eerily silent College Avenue in State College, Pennsylvania, to deliver a couple of pies to the community kitchen in my church basement. The town felt strangely somber. Streets were empty, students and many of the faculty members—more than half the borough's population—gone. Anyone who had an excuse to get out was relieved to do so. Nevertheless, an NBC news van sat perched at the edge of campus like a vulture, as if even on that still morning a savory bit of news might break.



As a Penn State faculty member who has never set foot in Beaver Stadium or watched a football game of any sort on television, I'll just say that I came to this place for another reason. But football money has funded a substantial portion of our library's holdings. It has endowed two professorships, one in my own department. And thanks to the influx of cash that football season brings to the region each fall, it has made Centre County a better place to live.

Across the university, we're all aware that we will be sharing the consequences of these crimes and cover-ups for a very long time.

What can a person do when the actions of a powerful one or few ruin things for so many? All I could think to do that morning was what I did the year before on Thanksgiving morning: rise early, make coffee, roll out crusts and whisk fillings, slide the pumpkin and pecan pies into the oven, and then drive them over to Saint Andrew's.

Like my students who were eager to identify with Penn State when its stock was up, I must consider the price of collective success and my own willingness to buy into it. Now, those students worry that the brand has gone bad. That fast, a university's winning reputation has been wrecked by willful evasions and strange manipulations and images of hooligans rioting in our streets.

Pressing On

I think of my father's chagrin after working for more than 30 years for a major corporation that in the late 1990s turned out to be rotten at the top. His retirement a few years too early was embittered by a sense of betrayal at the hands of a company that had once made him proud. I think of those associated with church organizations publicly shamed by corrupt or irresponsible leaders, or the happy-looking families undone by foolish moves.

It is easy for me to tell my students to use their words and their heads when they would prefer to take to the streets. Those are the English professor's stock sentiments. But what shall I do with my own disappointment and disgust?

The answer came without much thought on Thanksgiving morning: the pies, the drive over to St. Andrew's. In dark times, we fall back on those practices that a lifetime of practice has taught us. When words fail or fail to come, meaning and comfort spring from the most ordinary, elemental means: our work, small observances. This is the quiet spirit of Advent.

I will stick around when the TV vans have gone away, just as my father worked on for several years while his company painfully stuttered to a halt. I will continue to teach these kids who will have some difficult questions to answer in job interviews for a few years.

Driving back to my home in Bellefonte—a town of 6,000 where the preliminary hearings for Jerry Sandusky will be staged this Tuesday morning—I felt a rush of gratitude for sunlight on the forested ridgeline, my car two pies lighter. My heart felt lighter, too, with the satisfaction that comes from making something, from giving a gift that will vanish before the sun goes down, from doing one tiny thing I can respect.

By now I'm sure most of you know that we recently hosted seven Brazilian teenagers, one Brazilian priest and one chaplain from December 22 - 26. Our guests were from our companion Diocese of San Paulo and - for some - this was their very first visit to the States.

Over the five days they enjoyed the sights and sounds of State College, as well as experiencing Christmas at St Andrew's and discovering all kinds of new traditions with their host families.

Their biggest shock was - you guessed it - our Central Pennsylvanian weather, despite our protests that we were enjoying a mild Christmas! Our Brazilian guests had left home at the height of their summer and were quick to tell me that even in the depths of their winter (July) conditions remain much warmer.



The parish showed great generosity with gift cards, Christmas presents and all manner of kind gestures. As hard as I find this to understand, they all enjoy shopping and malls and, I'm sure, the gift cards will be quickly redeemed.

As they left, their leader told me that the young people wanted to stay in State College. However, the rest of their pilgrimage beckoned, so Rich Marini and Laurel Zydny whisked them away to Renovo. The rest of their itinerary includes Mansfield, Lancaster, Camp Hill and one night in DC before flying back to San Paulo.

So many worked hard to mark this visit a success - particularly Kelley Paulsen and Robin Bagby in planning and organizing. My biggest thanks go to our host families, who showed hospitality to strangers and found room for our guests in the midst of their own Christmas celebrations. So my appreciation to the Jones, Christopher, Andrew, Nairn and Paulsen families.

As we - Brazilians, Americans and this Brit - enjoyed worship, fellowship and recreation together, I was reminded that we are not only sisters and brothers in Christ Jesus, but also members together of the worldwide Anglican Communion. Every Sunday we worship not in isolation but in union with 80 million other Anglicans in 38 provinces across the globe, bound together by common ways of praying and a faith in scripture, reason and tradition. I hope these few days reminded all of us of our greater identity, and that our guests found our time together as transformational as I did.

FROM THE WARDENS

We are delighted to report a total increase so far of 11% in pledges for 2012. At a time when incomes are flat or disappearing, but at the same time gas and grocery prices are rising, we are really pleased that parishioners responded so well to the recent pledge campaign. A big thank you to Dick Gibboney and the stewardship committee for their thoughtful, energetic approach. Heartfelt thanks also to the five speakers, who shared their own pledging philosophies: they showed us not only what the income means to our budget at St Andrew's but also how pledging shapes our ability to take our proper role in the diocese and the national church. We are still not paying our full Fair Share assessment. In fact we are still \$20,000 short of doing so. Nonetheless, we are moving toward a more responsible position where we think of our Fair Share pledge earlier in the budget process. As we've learned through the stewardship talks and in Father Richard's sermons, stewardship is about finding our way on our own spiritual journey and finding our way in our parish community: time and talent count.

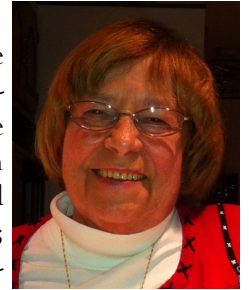
VESTRY CANDIDATES

What an honor to be asked to serve on the vestry at Saint Andrews. Glenn and I have been members of Saint Andrews since we moved to State College in 1973 and have enjoyed many facets of this active parish. Our children were confirmed here and were both active in EYC and Glenn served two terms on the vestry in the 70's. I have been an active participant in the Altar Guild; the Episcopal Church Women; co adult leader for the EYC for six years; the Prayer Shawl group; Stephen Ministry; occasionally worked in the gift shop; the Sojourners group; various study groups; and for the past ten years I have been associated with EfM, first as a student and then as a mentor. My association with our parish have been varied and very rewarding. I look forward to serving you as a vestryman.



Darla Lindberg, a registered architect and an Associate Professor of Architecture, was recruited to interview and then joined the faculty in the Architecture Department at Penn State in 1995. She received tenure and promotion in 1999. Darla and her sons, Trevor and Teague Berreth, joined St. Andrew's when they moved here. Her sons, serving in the youth choir and as acolytes, were both confirmed at St. Andrew's.

Darla was an original member of the Canterbury Society since it was formed at St. Andrew's and was a student in the first class of Education for Ministry under Fr. Kline. Members of her class journeyed to The University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee where she tested and received the "EfM Teacher's Certificate" in her 3rd year. At the Diocesan level, Darla served on two Discernment Committees for members considering the Deaconate. She was also appointed a voting delegate to the 2006 Convention which elected Bishop Baxter. Other opportunities to serve St. Andrew's include Personnel Committee, Planned Giving, Finance Committee, the original Columbarium Committee, the Adult Choir, Sedgwick Singers A cappella group and Chair of Property for years. As a participant in Property Committee's "the Holy Rollers" Darla has painted virtually every surface in the church. A most notable effort includes the installation of a laser smoke detection system in the Nave (credit given to her son Teague for the genius behind planting the laser receiver in the Bell Tower behind the solitary window). Fr. Hofer once told Darla her sins were forgiven but she "was banished to the Property Committee for life." She helped St. Andrew's through two building capital campaigns, including the purchase of Trinity House. She worked with the Borough to join the two lots from that purchase into one to create space for a permeable parking surface - a model in the Borough - allowing for reserve land next to Trinity House for future building expansion or garden use instead of storm water runoff. This is Darla's third time serving on the Vestry. Her first three year term on Vestry was from 1999 - 2002. She was on sabbatical from Penn State in 2002-2003. She returned to serve her second term on Vestry from 2003 - 2006. After devoting time to realize some important global design efforts and funded research in disease spread dynamics and the environment, Darla is turning her attention once again to her service on the Vestry at St. Andrew's.

Allison Shea, who has been a member of St. Andrew's since 1996, is married to Dennis Shea and has two children, Caroline, 15 and Connor, 10, a golden retriever, Jameson, and a cat, Robin Hood. 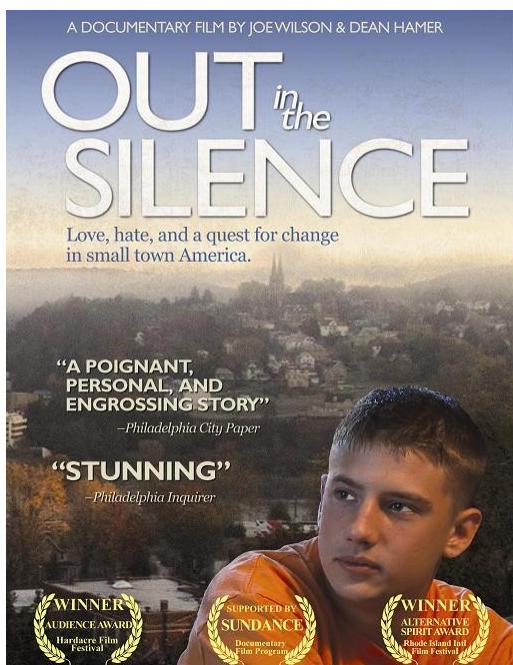
FRIDAY NIGHT FILMS

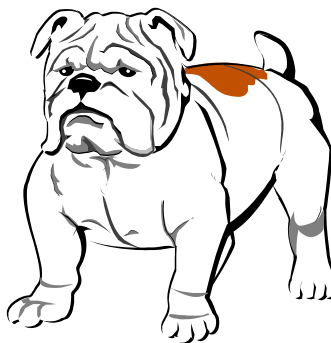
